IN PART TO ESCAPE SARA, ELEANOR WANTED TO BUILD A COTTAGE ON FALL KILL, A STREAM ON FRANKLIN'S PROPERTY A MILE AND A HALF EAST OF SPRINGWOOD, THEIR HYDE PARK ESTATE.



VAL-KILL WOULD BECOME ELEANOR'S REAL HOME, A WOMAN'S SANCTUARY OF BOOKS, ART, MUSIC, PICNICS, AND TALK RANGING FROM INTIMATE CONFIDENCES TO VEHEMENT POLITICAL DEBATES. "THE PEACE OF IT IS DIVINE," SHE WROTE FRANKLIN.



ELEANOR FOUND SATISFYING WORK IN RAISING A FAMILY, SUPPORTING A FACTORY THAT PRODUCED REPRODUCTION FURNITURE AND TEACHING AT A GIRLS' SCHOOL SHE OWNED PART OF IN THE PERIOD BETWEEN 1921 AND 1927 THAT SHE CALLED "PRIVATE INTERLUDE" IN HER MEMOIRS.



CIVIL RIGHTS


THE RIGHTS OF AFRICAN AMERICANS WERE THE TOP PRIORITY ON ELEANOR'S AGENDA. SHE BOLDLY COMPARED RACISM AND SEGREGATION TO FASCISM, PROVOKING A WILD OUTCRY AGAINST HER.



























DURING THE FIRST MONTHS AFTER HER HUSBAND'S DEATH, ELEANOR PUT HER LIFE IN ORDER, TAKING CARE OF FRANKLIN'S ESTATE, TURNING THE BIG HOUSE OVER TO THE GOVERNMENT, PURCHASING VALKILL AND 825 ACRES FOR HERSELF.





SHE WROTE TO PRESIDENT TRUMAN EVERY WEEK,
OFFERING COMMENTS, SUGGESTIONS, AND WARNINGS,
USING EVERY OPPORTUNITY TO TALK ABOUT DOMESTIC
POLITICS - FAIR EMPLOYMENT PRACTICES, THE POLL
TAX, PARTY JOBS FOR WOMEN - AND FOREIGN ISSUES.
TRUMAN ALWAYS RESPONDED PROMPTLY, IN
LONGHAND, URGING HER TO WRITE AGAIN AND OFTEN
MAKING AN EFFORT TO RESPOND TO HER SUGGESTIONS.

WOMEN'S RIGHTS

THE PRESIDENT ASKED IF SHE WOULD AGREE TO BE A DELEGATE TO THE FIRST ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING OF THE UNITED NATIONS GENERAL ASSEMBLY IN LONDON IN DECEMBER 1945.



WOMEN'S RIGHTS

THE DELEGATION WAS A STELLAR LINEUP - BUT IT WAS ELEANOR WHO CAPTURED THE HEADLINES. HER APPOINTMENT MADE THE FRONT PAGE OF THE NEW YORK TIMES. WHEN ONE SENATOR VOTED AGAINST HER CONFIRMATION IN THE SENATE, IT WAS ALSO FRONT-PAGE NEWS.


"I USED TO THINK I HAD REACHED THE LIMITS OF MY PATIENCE BRINGING UP FIVE CHILDREN," SHE WOULD LATER QUIP, "BUT I WAS MISTAKEN. IT TOOK MUCH MORE PATIENCE TO PRESIDE OVER THE COMMISSION ON HUMAN RIGHTS."



IN THIRTY CRISP AND CONCISE ARTICLES, THE DECLARATION RECOGNIZES THE RIGHTS OF ALL INDIVIDUALS TO LIFE, LIBERTY, AND SECURITY OF PERSON. THERE SHALL BE NO SLAVERY OR SERVITUDE. NO ONE MAY BE SUBJECTED TO TORTURE OF CRUEL PUNISHMENT. ALL PEOPLE ARE EQUAL BEFORE THE LAW.



NO ONE MAY BE ARRESTED ARBITRARILY; THE ACCUSED HAVE THE RIGHT TO A FAIR AND PUBLIC HEARING AND THE RIGHT TO BE PRESUMED INNOCENT. EVERY INDIVIDUAL POSSESSES THE RIGHT TO A NATIONALITY OR, FOR THOSE WITHOUT A NATIONALITY, TO THE PROTECTION OF THE UNITED NATIONS.






THEY MAY OWN PROPERTY. THEY POSSESS FREEDOM OF THOUGHT, CONSCIENCE, AND RELIGION. THEY HAVE THE RIGHT TO EXPRESS AND PROMULGATE THEIR OPINIONS, AND THEY MAY ASSEMBLY PEACEFULLY. PEOPLE HAVE THE RIGHT TO A GOVERNMENT WHOSE AUTHORITY COMES FROM PERIODIC AND "GENUINE" ELECTIONS DECIDED BY UNIVERSAL AND EQUAL SUFFRAGE AND BY SECRET VOTE.




AND PEOPLE HAVE SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RIGHTS TOO: THE RIGHT TO ENTER INTO A MARRIAGE OF THEIR FREE CHOOSING AND TO FOUND A FAMILY. PEOPLE HAVE A RIGHT TO PRIVACY, ELEMENTARY EDUCATION MUST BE COMPULSORY AND FREE; HIGHER EDUCATION MUST BE EQUALLY ACCESSIBLE TO ALL ON THE BASIS OF MERIT.



PEOPLE HAVE THE RIGHT TO WORK, TO JOIN TRADE UNIONS, TO HAVE EQUAL PAY FOR EQUAL WORK, TO HAVE JUST REMUNERATION. THEY HAVE THE RIGHT TO A **DECENT STANDARD OF LIVING THAT INCLUDES MEDICAL** CARE, NECESSARY SOCIAL SERVICES, AND PROTECTION AGAINST ILLNESS AND DISABILITY, AND THEY HAVE A RIGHT TO SECURITY IN OLD AGE. MOTHER AND CHILDREN HAVE A RIGHT TO "SPECIAL CARE."





